<a href="#">Thursday, January 15</a>	<b>Incident Investigation &amp; OSHA Recordability</b> – Proper recordkeeping and determining root cause are the foundation to prevent recurrence of injuries and illnesses. We'll discuss the criteria for determining OSHA recordability and why each incident, near miss and first aid should be investigated.
<a href="#">Thursday, February 5</a>	<b>Hazard Recognition: Education &amp; Walkthroughs</b> – Hazard recognition is a basic element to a strong safety culture. In this webinar, we'll discuss how to incorporate hazard recognition throughout the organization.
<a href="#">Thursday, March 5</a>	<b>OSHA's Top Violated Standards</b> – Every year OSHA releases the top 10 standards with the most citations and updates to emphasis programs. During this webinar, we'll review the top 10 standards and touch on Region V Emphasis Programs that impact manufacturers.
<a href="#">Thursday, April 2</a>	<b>Hot Work &amp; Heat Stress: The New OSHA Standard</b> – OSHA has proposed a heat stress standard that would apply to all employees in both indoor and outdoor work that is not climate controlled. We'll discuss written plans, monitoring conditions, training and recordkeeping requirements.
<a href="#">Thursday, May 7</a>	<b>Wellbeing: The Next Step for Your Health &amp; Safety Program</b> – Wellbeing can be integrated into your current safety program to improve performance, retention and safety. We'll discuss why H&S is expanding beyond injury prevention, the elements of a wellbeing program, and tips to get started.
<a href="#">Thursday, June 11</a>	<b>Leaders as Safety Champions</b> – Without leadership commitment, safety culture will continue to flounder. In this webinar, we'll discuss the role and influence of leaders, communication, and reinforcing safety behaviors.
<a href="#">Thursday, July 9</a>	<b>Process Safety Management: The What &amp; How</b> – The OSHA standard for Process Safety Management (PSM) has very specific requirements. During this webinar, we'll outline conditions/chemicals that require PSM implementation and the 14 elements of PSM.
<a href="#">Thursday, August 6</a>	<b>Emergency Planning Including Workplace Violence &amp; Active Threats</b> – During this webinar, we'll outline the OSHA-required elements to emergency planning and other considerations to include in your emergency planning, including workplace violence and active threats.
<a href="#">Thursday, September 3</a>	<b>Machine Guarding</b> – Machine guarding is not just a compliance issue; it's a step in preventing injuries and minimizing worker compensation costs. In this webinar, we'll review machine safeguard types, suggest machine safeguard inspections and reasons guarding fails.
<a href="#">Thursday, October 8</a>	<b>Working at Elevations: Fall Protection Now &amp; Upcoming</b> – Fall protection is not just a construction issue. During this webinar, we'll identify common fall hazards in manufacturing, suggest fall protection solutions, and discuss ladder systems and other design engineering solutions.
<a href="#">Thursday, November 12</a>	<b>Recognizing Fire Hazards &amp; Implementing Controls</b> – Fire can result in injury, production losses and insurance claims. We'll discuss common fire hazards, often overlooked fire hazards, and hot work operations.
<a href="#">Thursday, December 10</a>	<b>Ergonomics: Reduce Risk &amp; Increase Productivity</b> – Ergonomic programs are often misunderstood. Musculoskeletal disorders impact safety, productivity and costs. Participants will learn to identify risks, suggest solutions and offer ideas for improving performance.
